About the Artist

Miwa Matreyek is an internationally recognized animator, designer, and multimedia artist based in Los Angeles. She creates animated short films as well as live works that integrate animation, performance, and video installation. Arriving to animation from a background in collage, her work explores how animation transforms when it is combined with body, both physically in her performance pieces, as well as a composited video element in her short films.

In her projection based performances, animation takes on a more physical and present quality, while body and space take on a more fantastical quality, creating an experience that is both cinematic and theatrical. She is interested in the slippery meeting point of cinema and theater/performance, the moments of convergence where fantastical illusions are created, and the moments of divergence where the two struggles against each other.

Her work has been shown internationally at animation/film festivals, theater festivals, performance festivals, as well as art galleries, science museums, tech conferences, universities, and more.

Some past presentation include TEDGlobal, Sundance Film Festival, Anima Mundi Animation Festival, Time Based Arts Festival, REDCAT, ISEA, Theatre de la Cité, the Exploratorium, EXIT festival, Fusebox Festival, Questfest, Pixilerations, Yerba Buena Center for the Arts, and more.

Matreyek received her MFA (2007) in Experimental Animation and Integrated Media at the California Institute of the Arts. She is one of the founding-member and core-collaborator of <u>Cloud Eye Control</u>.

About This World Made Itself

This World Made Itself is the latest multimedia live performance piece by media artist Miwa Matreyek. The work combines projected animation and the artist's live shadow on screen, as she becomes part of and interacts with the fantastical world of the video. Merging film and theater to create a multimedia spectacle, This World Made Itself is a visually and musically-rich journey through the history of the earth, from the universe's epic beginnings to our current, complex world of human interaction. The piece will unfold both on a semi-scientific level (imagine flipping through an illustrated children's encyclopedia) and an emotional dream-like level of surrealism, metaphor, and fantasy. This World Made Itself taps into our desires to see and touch worlds beyond our physical presence/present moment, and grasps at a visceral sense of time and space.


Storyboarding and Constructing Narratives


Other Useful Websites and Tools


<u>Narrative Image</u> The how and why of visual storytelling is a great online slide show about how narratives can be told through images.

Art of Storyboarding: This book will show beginners how to use storyboards to communicate their vision to the cinematographer, set designer and special effects supervisor, or to create the skeletal outline around which an animated program is developed, or to plan a multimedia project. It covers the history and evolution of this craft and discusses the essentials of translating one's vision onto paper from the rough sketch to the finished storyboard. Illustrations from the author's and other storyboard artists' work illuminate the text throughout.

The children write better and with more detail after learning his methods of Storyboard and TellingBoard writing, with especially good gains for special needs students. Tree of Codes is a haunting new story by best-selling American writer, Jonathan Safran Foer. With a different die-cut on every page, Tree of Codes explores previously unchartered literary territory. Initially deemed impossible to make, the book is a first — as much a sculptural object as it is a work of masterful storytelling. Tree of Codes is the story of an enormous last day of life — as one character's life is chased to extinction, Foer multi-layers the story with immense, anxious, at times disorientating imagery, crossing both a sense of time and place, making the story of one person's last day everyone's story. Inspired to exhume a new story from an existing text, Jonathan Safran Foer has taken his "favorite" book, The Street of Crocodiles by Polish-Jewish writer Bruno Schulz, and used it as a canvas, cutting into and out of the pages, to

arrive at an original new story told in Jonathan Safran Foer's own acclaimed voice.
